B'NEI MITZVAH TIMELINE

FALL OF 4TH GRADE

Complete the B'nei Mitzvah date request form and receive date.

11 MONTHS BEFORE THE BIG DAY

Tutoring begins.

1 MONTH BEFORE THE BIG DAY

Students begin rehearsals with officiating clergy. There are two rehearsals for the students, and one for students and parents.

ONE YEAR BEFORE THE BIG DAY

Parents and students meet with Cantor Kipnis to receive the B'nei Mitzvah binder, Mitzvah Project Planning Guide, and learn more about the tutoring program.

5 MONTHS BEFORE THE BIG DAY

Students begin a series of meetings with the officiating rabbi to work on the D'var Torah (short teaching interpreting the Torah portion) and to discuss the Mitzvah Project. They will also have two progress checkin meetings with

A FEW WEEKS AFTER

Students meet with a member of our clergy team to reflect on the experience as well as to discuss ongoing learning and engagement.

THE BIG DAY

Celebrate as our students become B'nei Mitzvah, leading Shabbat worship and teaching Torah for their family, friends, and Shaaray Tefila community.

B'NEI MITZVAH FAQS

Who will officiate at the service?

Officiating clergy is determined by a number of factors. Whomever officiates will partner with and guide families on their journey, ensuring a meaningful experience.

Are students expected to attend Shabbat services before they become B'nei Mitzvah?

Yes! We ask students to attend at least three Friday evening services and six Shabbat morning services before becoming B'nei Mitzvah. It is also Shaaray Tefila's tradition that families serve as ushers at both an Erev Shabbat and a Shabbat morning service. This is an opportunity to meaningfully participate in the community and support fellow B'nei Mitzvah families.

Can we take photos during the service?

Photography and videography are not allowed in the sanctuary during services. However, we do live stream the service and provide families with a recording. If you wish to take photos in the sanctuary, you may do so on a different day by making arrangements in advance with Rachel Kaplan, B'nei Mitzvah Administrator.

Is it required to host a Kiddush luncheon after the service?

No. Kiddush luncheons are completely optional. Please speak with Rachel if you are interested in reserving space for a luncheon, and she can send you a list of our preferred vendors.

What is expected of parents as students prepare? Parents may be asked to attend meetings with clergy, and, as noted above, are invited to usher at Shabbat services. At Shaaray Tefila, we view this process as a family experience. The clergy and staff partner with families in making this simcha personally meaningful and a source of pride for our congregation.



Are there any opportunities for family members to participate in the service?

There are honors appropriate for people of all ages and faiths. Family members and friends can participate in Erev Shabbat and Shabbat morning services through rituals (opening the Ark, dressing the Torah, etc.), as well as Hebrew or English readings.

How can families commemorate this simcha or express appreciation to the clergy and congregation?

A meaningful way to celebrate children becoming B'nei Mitzvah is through a gift of tzedakah to Temple Shaaray Tefila. We ask that you consider an increased gift to our Annual Appeal, so that we can ensure that Shaaray Tefila remains a source of meaning, connection, and purpose, for every family and our entire congregation. What's next for students after becoming B'nei Mitzvah?

Becoming B'nei Mitzvah is not the end but a beginning in our children's Jewish journey. Pathways, our teen program beginning in the spring of 8th grade, is the next step. This comprehensive, choice-based program focuses on building Jewish identity, creating Jewish community, and improving the world around us. Teens are empowered to forge their own Jewish path by choosing from a variety of opportunities including participating in our youth group (TaSTY), serving as a Teaching Assistant (TA) in our Religious School, learning with our clergy and faculty in electives, traveling to Israel and across the US, interning with Shaaray Tefila staff mentors, or working with staff and clergy create "path" that works with their schedule and speaks to their interests.
